In Georgia, the vision is to inspire, promote, and sustain positive outcomes and holistic wellness, including mental health and well-being, across every developmental domain.







Increase access to screening, assessment and referral to services for children and families

At a glance: Muscogee County



- The city has surpassed the city of Augusta to become Georgia's second largest city with a population of 194,413, while the larger Columbus-Phenix City Metropolitan Area counts 310,531.
- An estimated 46.3% of the city's population is White, 45.5% is Black, and 6.4% is Hispanic
- Columbus is home to Fort Benning, one of the largest military installations in the United States. Ft. Benning supports more than 120,000 active-duty military, family members, reserve component soldiers, retirees and civilian employees on a daily basis.

At a glance: Muscogee County

Over 14% of the population is age 9 and under. There were 14,563 children under 5 years, and another 13,055 aged 5 to 9 years.

The percentage of low birth weight babies is 11.5% compared with 9.4% statewide.

The infant mortality rate is 9.7, compared with 6.7 for the state.

There were 9,722 children 0-8 years of age living in Muscogee County with 11 months of Medicaid eligibility in 2013; approximately 2/3 of them had a well-child visit during the year

Less than half of the 1-3 year olds had a developmental screening in 2013 as measured by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) core measure.

Local Goals

Expand early identification and linkage of children at risk for social-emotional and behavioral delays to provide timely support for children and parents.

Increase the capacity of providers of Muscogee County who serve young children and to provide integrated comprehensive behavioral health services.

Build common infrastructure between child serving agencies at the state and local levels
